To Whoever it may concern,

This is a report examining the document, 'North Byron Parklands Proposal – Assessment of Economic Impacts, by HillPDA' (6 August 2018), and various other claims regarding the economic impacts of the proposal. The following documents were considered:

- Economic Impacts and Benefits 2016, by RPS
- North Byron Parklands Proposal Assessment of Economic Impacts, by HillPDA
- Submissions made by the community

1. Comments on Methodology

HillPDA's process appears to be fundamentally flawed from the outset. In their introduction, they note that they liaised with RPS, the consultant directly employed by NBP. However they failed to liaise with anyone on the community side. Thus they gave the applicant or their employees opportunity to counter the arguments made by the community, and to provide further information and facilitation payments. The same opportunities were not granted to the objectors. This is an abuse of the process and the entire report should consequently be treated with extreme caution.

2. Comments on "3. Estimated CIV and Jobs in Construction"

The estimate provided by HillPDA is acceptable but of little value due to HillPDA's own qualification which immediately follows their estimate. Overall, there is no doubt that the new jobs created by NBP's investment would be offset at least to some extent by jobs lost in the local entertainment industry, since the approval of such a development on terms which appear favourable to the developer will inevitably cause a loss of business confidence and investment in competing businesses (see the Australian government's National Competition Policy). HillPDA's final remarks are particularly apt in this context, "Multiplied job numbers can lead to the impression that these are total jobs created whereas many of the jobs could be redirected to alternative projects if the subject project did not proceed. Note also that the multipliers are nation-wide and not local or regional."

The estimates of jobs created which were supplied by RPS in their reports do not add up. In 2.4 and 2.5 of their 2015 report, RPS claim that: \$3.4 million in direct wages yields 118 EFT jobs in Byron Shire; that \$5.2 million in direct wages yields 152 jobs in the Northern Rivers, and; that total expenditure on wages of \$12.9 million yields 356 jobs. Dividing the wages paid by the number of jobs reveals that these 'jobs' were calculated at \$28,800 p.a., when the minimum wage in 2015 was \$17.29 per hour, or \$34,165 p.a.. Casual employees (such as the great majority of festival staff) were also entitled to a 25% loading, bringing the minimum wage to \$42,706 p.a. in such cases.

3. Comments on "4. Comments on the RPS Report"

- 3.1 "Assuming the total revenue or outputs are correct..." is a matter of guesswork in the absence of audited accounts.
- 3.2 In 4.2 of their report, HillPDA rightly note that the daily expenditure figures used by RPS are excessively high. However HillPDA's acceptance of these figures on the basis of just one submission and "...consultation with NBP and festival organisers..." is weak and must be rejected. According to the RPS report, neither RPS, NBP nor HillPDA have ever interviewed any festivalgoers, thus there is no useful data. Without useful data, it's 'garbage in, garbage out'.

4. Comments on "5. Comments on the Objections"

- 4.1 This section highlights the limitations of the approval process. HillPDA mention the lack of a full Cost Benefit Analysis (CBA) four times in this section alone.
- 4.2 In 5.4 of their report, HillPDA characterise a contention by 'Australians For Animals NSW Inc' as entirely subjective. This is not fair as parts of their contention can be objectively demonstrated (see 3.2

above).

- 4.3 HillPDA's criticism of the report 'Assessing the Adverse Economic Impact of SITG and the Falls Festivals' (which they characterise as 'anonymous' despite the names at the top) is unfair and inconsistent. They state (at 5.7) that, "The submission is considered weak in evidence and appears to be based on interviews and subjective judgements." However, regarding the conflicting NBP report, they state (at 5.6), "Interviews may be an appropriate source of data, particularly given the difficulty in obtaining suitable data elsewhere."
- 4.4 In 5.7 of their report, Hill PDA also note that 'Assessing the Adverse Economic Impact of SITG and the Falls Festivals' is "...subjective...". In part it is, but no less subjective than the RPS report. The methodologies employed by RPS and the objectors in their respective reports are remarkably similar. Both sides have relied on interviews for the collection of data, and have then generously applied economic multipliers to their figures. We note that NBP failed to indicate their sample size.
- 4.5 In the same section, HillPDA note that the objectors' report, "...would be better if it was supported with financial statements." Again we do not

dispute this remark, but note that it is inconsistent since they do not level the same accusation at the RPS report which also lacks financial statements.

- 4.6 HillPDA's claim that the "...estimate of total impacts is simplistic..." is unjustified. The authors clearly state that, "The 21 businesses surveyed represented approximately half the venues in the region in terms of turnover and patronage." Thus a doubling of the figures derived from their primary analysis is appropriate. RPS have not supplied a sample size or indicated how their totals were reached, so there are no grounds for HillPDA's apparent preference for RPS's methodology.
- 4.7 HillPDA have misquoted the figures here. They should read, "..calculated the losses to be \$24.1m every year. A further \$12.1m was lost every year in investment..." This gives a total of \$36.2m.
- 4.8 Section 5.8 of the HillPDA report discusses some of the inherent problems with the use of economic multipliers. HillPDA's inconsistent acceptance of data collected from interviews has been discussed above (see 4.4 and 4.5).
- 4.9 In 5.8 of their report, HillPDA has naively accepted two unsubstantiated statements from NBP: "RPS

advised that the \$17.5m spend by organisers are not direct inputs to the goods and services consumed by patrons. It relates to security, cleaning and other services paid from admission sales. Hence there is no double counting...", and, "According to their website NBP is Australian owned. This issue is not relevant." The former assertion should be supported by financial statements particularly in light of 5.7, while the latter is merely an unsubstantiated self-declaration on a website. NBP is a property trust, and its ownership is therefore unknown. The festivals which operate from the site are owned by the American corporation 'Live Nation'. Thus the prospects of profits being repatriated to USA and a net reduction in tax receipts are real.

4.10 We note that the, "...net increase in expenditure captured..." (HillPDA 5.8) can only be identified by narrowing the geographical focus. HillPDA have made no attempt to substantiate their claim that, "There is also some net benefit, even at the national standing as the venue and its events... stimulates additional consumption...", and it is not supported by the available data. Both the HillPDA report (at 5.8) and 'Assessing the Adverse Economic Impact of SITG and the Falls Festivals' suggest the consumption recorded by the festivals has probably been transferred from other venues.

5. Comments on '7. Conclusions and Recommendations'

5.1 HillPDA's opening statement, "The proposal will clearly

provide a net economic benefit to the State of NSW given that it brings patrons down from Queensland..." is the sort of parochial thinking based on 19th century colonial rivalries which is not constructive in a 21st century globalised economy. The competition between states to 'attract' business quickly becomes a 'race to reach the bottom'.

"...Significant success by any individual State invariably precipitates copying or retaliation by others. If all States

engage in such inter-state rivalry, there is a real chance that their actions will largely cancel each other out, with little effect on the location of investment in the longer term, but with increased costs to the States' taxpayers. ('State, Territory and Local Government Assistance to Industry', Industry Commission, AGPS, 1996, p 41)

- 5.2 This attention to state rivalries in order to justify the application indicates that the approval process is in the wrong hands. It should therefore be returned to Byron Shire Council.
- 5.3 Due to an absence of reliable financial figures, there is currently insufficient data to make a determination regarding the advisability of proceeding with the application. HillPDA's assertion that, "If there were reasonable grounds for refusal it would not be on direct economic impact grounds," is not supported on the available material (see 1-4 above).

Hence any approval granted should be of a temporary nature.

5.4 While we agree with the recommendation that a CBA should be conducted, the first term of reference suggested by HillPDA should be amended to read, "The standing or economy being considered should not be geographically limited..." (see 5.1 above).

5.5 To ensure wide acceptance, the CBA should not be conducted according to HillPDA's recommendations, but by a disinterested third party who is acceptable to both sides and has no links to government or the consultancy industry.

Please compare these with the historical evidence, especially in light of the quadrupling of the population in Byron Bay during the 30 year interval.





HAP: Tell me about how you made it to the top.

GEORGE: Ah, I had to make it with all these women, see, to get to the top. Man it was tough. It's hard to do.

HAP: Did your parents want you to get into Rock n Roll? GEORGE: My mother thought it was a great idea. She said, "You can't work, man". She said "You gotta get into the entertainment business 'cause you're lousy at workin'". She said "This is the thing you're best at, you just gotta figure out how to make a dollar at it." I can't work. I tried to work



man, I just couldn't do it. HAP: Didn't you work in a fish

GEORGE: Aw - that was a terrible job. Every mornin' a guy would come in and say 'Lemme see crabs" and I'd have to go into these coolers, see, and one of 'em'd be full of crabs and you have to let the customer see it 'cause if you sell a dead crab in Pennsylvania it's against the law. If someone eats a dead crab you can get real sick. You might even be able to die from it. So you gotta make sure everyone of em's alive. But see the cooler numbs 'em real bad so they can barely move but as soon as you take 'em out in the 100 degree heat they start movin' real fast, ya know, and while you're grabbin' 'em, man, they'd be pinchin' ya and grabbin' at ya and, ah it was awful. It was a bullshit job. I'd go home and practice the guitar until my fingers bled and say "Man, there's gotta be something' better than this."

HAP: What's the most thrilling part of your work?

GEORGE: The real thrill is when you're off the stage and people talk to you. When you're on stage you're workin'. Some nights it's hard and some nights its easy. The whole thing in | general is a thrill. I get a thrill outta these in-stores, ya know, where you go to a store and sign autographs on albums. Now that's thrilling.

HAP: What are your hobbies? GEORGE: Weil, I'm a baseball enthusiast. I like the Mets and I go to a lot of ball games and I play a lot of baseball, too. I'm on a couple of teams. Drinkin' is another big thing. I've been drinkin' too much bourbon, ya know - like I used to. I've been drinkin' that too much. Gotta stay away from that.

HAP: What are your plans for the future?

GEORGE: I'd like to continue being an entertainer and performer as long as possible and die in bed with a 20 year old girl at the age of 100.



Horace Bevan, master of the Fender Stratocaster, is a man firmly committed to rock n roll. At the age of 16 he made the guitar an extension of his own body, never letting it rest. For three years he sat and played and practiced and perfected his instrument, never once removing his mind from the fretboard. He learned every scale, every abstract chord, every finger contortion the guitatr books could throw at him. He didn't smoke, didn't drink, didn't go out, didn't even look at the walls. Just played and payed his dues. Then he quit his job at the steelworks in Newcastle and came back home to Lennox Head.

His first band, Pirate Radio, lasted two years and gave the shy, young man his first taste of limelight. Rockola was his next endeavour, working under the watchful eye of Big Al Hardwood who took Horace under his wing and made a musician out of him

Rockola took off like a rocket as Horace played his guts out in a sort-of three year rock n roll apprenticeship which included a full year alongside mega guitar whiz Phil Emmanuel.

In January 1987 Horace met Colin Germano-then lead singer with an obscure



underground band called The Blest, at a party in Lismore and the two exchanged words - not pleasant ones either. Nevertheless, together they formed Bourbon Street four weeks later and Horace's playing quickly developed into an incredibly unique style, influenced by the world's most renowned blues guitarists and their white successors.

It was this transformation that led to Bourbon Street's rapid rise in popularity and established Horace Bevan as one of our country's greatest rock guitarists. At gigs up and down the east coast of Australia, Bourbon Street attract an army of young guitar devotees who's loyalty to Horace's playing is an inspriation to the future of rock n roll.

After nearly three years on the road, those initial unpleasant words are now like pepper on sweet corn as they continue to grow both musically and creatively.

With their second album due for release in December, Bourbon Street look more promising than ever to become one of Australia's proud exports. Through it all Loud Fingers Horace eats up everything Rock n Roll dishes out and just keeps coming back for more.

Coming to Town

ROSS WILSON - The Dark Side

Ross Wilson, the Daddy Cool of Mondo Rock, has just released an autobiogtraphical album called **The Dark Side of The Man.**

He was welcomed into the Australian Music Hall of Fame this year for working "...tirelessly to encourage and develop new talent and making Australian music more viable for every artist, on every level."

His career began in 1964. In 1970 he pared down Vegetal Mother to a combo and Daddy Cool was born. They released the Australian rock-classic Eagle Rock in 1971. He produced Sky Hooks "Living in the 70's" in 1974. In 1976 he masterminded the soundtrack for Australia's first rock movie, OZ. That put Jo Jo Zep and The Falcons on the charts for the first time. Ross' "Living in The Land of Oz" from the same movie created controversy as the first charting pop single to call for Aboriginal land rights.


Mondo Rock was formed in 1978. Their hits to date are Cool World, Chemistry, No Time, Come Said the Boy, Primitive Love Rites and I'm Free.

He also wrote the top charting fun pop single "Bop Girl" in 1983 sung by his wife, Pat Wilson.

On the Dark Side of The Man album he was in the right place at the right time to obtain 'preferred' session player, Bernie Worrell (Parliament); Daryl Johnson (Neville Bros. backing vocalist); Australians Vince Jones and Russell Smith (Trombone) to name but a few who play

on various tracks of the album which was recorded in New York, Sydney and Melbourne.

Ross Wilson's name is synonomous with quality. Bed of Nails from The Dark Side of the Man album is racing up the charts but as Ross says "The best is yet to come". Ross Wilson will be appearing at the Arts Factory, Byron Bay on and at Toormina Hotel, Sawtell on the 26th.




