# Is Drayton breakthrough Mounting pressure from within the unions open cut unions and initially the steering committee

could result in Drayton Mine being manned by the end of the week, it was claimed last night.

A series of mass meetings in the Upper Hunter this week is likely to see the great majority of open cut workers wanting the bans on Drayton lifted.

These meetings have been precipitated by last week's formation of an open cut steering committee.

A spokesman for the committee last night claimed that support for the move had been tremendous and went on: "Something will happen by the end of this week.

"Drayton could be manned by one way or the other by

If that happens, it remains to be seen whether it resolves the issue or merely escalates it into a national

Maritime unions have already threatened to stop any export coal from going through the Port of Newcastle if Drayton is manned against official union wishes.

In the event of that, the spokesman said: "We would look to the Government and the ACTU to step in if the Port stopped because that would ruin the industry.

The steering committee, formed only last Wednesday at Muswellbrook, has called an aggregate meeting of all open cut workers

And despite rumours that the meeting was off, the committee spokesman told the Argus: "It's definitely on."

Those rumours began following a meeting between representatives of the new committee and the Combined Mining Unions' Northern Liaison Committee last

The Northern Liaison Committee agreeed to the holding of a series of aggregate meetings by individual

accepted this.

Then the steering committee changed their mind, preferring instead to have one big meeting of all the open cut unions, as originally planned.

It is expected that the meeting will endorse the formation of an Open Cut Liaison Committee.

Some district officials are likely to attend and a committee spokesman said that the Mines Mechanics Association had promised to take no retaliatory action against their members if they attended on Tuesday.

But the spokesman claimed there had been a threat to Saxonvale Mine members of the Miners Federation that they would be "out of a job" if they attended.

In addition to the meeting, however, open cut unions are going ahead with aggregate meetings of their own union members this week.

The AMWSU will hold theirs after Tuesday's Showground meeting. The Miners Federation meeting is set down for Wednesday between shifts at Ravensworth, and the Mines Mechanics Association have called a 24 hour stoppage on Thursday for their members to attend an aggregate meeting.

At the root of the problem, as far as the steering committee is concerned, is the fact that open cut workers are outnumbered more than 3-1 in the Northern district.

Although, following Thursday's meeting open cut workers have a stronger voice on the Northern Liaison Committee, they feel that voting would still go against them by a large majority at any Northern district aggregate meeting.

# Shergar mystery

The NSW Government is committed to the opening of Drayton committed Mineral Mine. Resources Minister, Mr Stewart, said in Singleton on Friday at the end of a three day visit to the Hunter Valley.

He rejected the criticism that the Government has been sitting on the fence over union bans at Dayton and said he would be holding urgent discussions with the Premier, Mr Wran.

Mr Stewart also made a "cool it" plea to the unions over Drayton and various other troubles currently threatening the NSW mining industry.

The Minister visited various mine projects in Newcastle and the Valley during his three days and he spoke to the Argus at the end of his final visit - to Mt Thorley mine.

The three days provided him with his first experience of open cut mining prior to an overseas trip to Japan and Korea, but he had been keeping a close watch on the growing Drayton crisis during the
