In closing, in the words of Jarmbe Githabul....

"Before colonisation, this land ran on wisdom. It ran on what people actually need to survive. It ran on the understanding that we can't live without the Earth. Not an Earth that's been mucked up like this (by mining), an Earth that's natural and healthy. tell me, if you could ever picture walking out there (through land that has been mined), on that same patch of land, and ever being able to find food again? Could anyone ever expect that? Coal is a natural fertiliser for the above ground plants. You take that out, and the above ground plants will not grow again. Ever. This

place is going to be worse than the desert. At least in the desert, there's food around. All those blokes down there that work for the mining company, think they're doing this work to feed their families. They're stealing from them."
