Dear Panel Chair for the Bylong Coal Project,

On behalf of the Lane Cove Coal and Gas Watch I present you with approx. 250 form submissions asking for the Bylong Coal project to be rejected.

These form submissions were signed by members of the general public in Lane Cove Plaza on Saturday 10th November at one of our stalls. We were there from 9.00am till 3.00 with three shifts of two volunteers.

We feel this gives the IPC a finger on the pulse concerning public sentiment. Nearly everyone agreed to sign this submission. The over whelming majority felt Australia should not be starting green field coal mines. This is a sentiment which is growing. We have been holding regular stalls in the plaza for nearly five years and we are finding fewer and fewer people in opposition. More and more people are also raising climate change as an issue. We truly hope the IPC know what is at stake here and hope they will represent community wishes and follow common sense. It really is time to put the environment, prevention of climate change and preservation of water resources in farming communities ahead of new coal mines.

It is important for the IPC to hear from people on the street and understand the negative sentiment towards coal mining. These letters could have been signed and collected in any suburb of Sydney. Even coal mining communities in the Hunter Valley are asking for a transition plan away from coal.

Please think of the bigger picture when considering this coal mine. At the moment there are no jobs dependant on the Bylong coal project, so no workers to transition to a new industry. Let's not create a whole new group of people who are reliant on this industry which we need to phase out.
