I am a resident at Burradoo whose local community will be directly and adversely affected by the proposed development and make this submission in opposition to the development.

The grounds of my objection are;-

There are a number of Schools within close proximity of the development that will be impacted by any wind borne particles resulting from the development. The effect of wind borne particle waste on children and indeed adults in the surrounding or adjoining area over a number of years has not been fully examined. By way of explanation and comment, should the Commission not consider the consequences of asbestos mining approval of the last century. Approval for asbestos mining was given in cases where the effect of asbestos on individuals was not known. I am not saying that this development is the same as asbestos mining; far from it, but what I am submitting is that there is just not enough knowledge about the effects on the community of what is proposed. If there is any doubt or unsureness of the possible long term effect not only about wind borne waste but also water contamination approval should be refused.

There could be a problem with water contamination..

Truck movements; As presently advised there will likely be 250 heavy vehicle truck movements per day. It is said by the developpers representative that truck movements will be along Douglas Road and not through Moss Vale. How can this be guaranteed? It could be assumed that truck drivers and any independent contractors will determine their own way to the site. How will truck operations be policed. What will happen if there are trucks using Argyle Street. It must be reasonably assumed that trucks will transit the main streets of Moss Vale, creating traffic congestion along an already conjested road.

The development will change the social rubric of the area with Moss Vale and surrounding towns, villages becoming an industrialised area rather than rural. The site is said to operate 24 hours a day 7 days a week, destroying the amenity of the area. One would assume that if the project is successful there will be more truck movements over time and the tonnage of waste for recycling increased with the consequence that the points made above will be exacabated.

There are respectfully enough doubts about this development that it should be rejected
